

#### The Rooster...

Emmaus brothers and sisters,

The Emmaus walk has represented many things to me over the years and, occasionally, I have asked myself, "Why is that used by Emmaus"? One of those "icons" is the rooster that sits on the conference room tables. Why a rooster and not a lion, or a majestic eagle or some other magnificent animal?

According to history, the first Cursillo took place in Spain in 1947 and at the conclusion of their three days they were returning from their weekend on a bus.



The rooster, described as the most colorful domestic creature on earth, had tail feathers that had significance in their color. The display of these colors is a reminder of the promise of God who said He would never destroy the earth again with water and he gave us the rainbow as evidence. Some of the meanings of these colors might be:

Green – denoting new life, growth, and the beauty of God's creation.

Blue – denoting loyalty to God, truth and justice.

Purple – denoting our dying and rising again with the suffering of Christ.

Red – denoting joy and confirmation.

Yellow/Orange- denotes warmth, light and promise as well as the changing of seasons.

The Rooster, called the "Rainbow Bird" sets ablaze these colors when in the sunlight. It should be noted that without the light, the Rooster becomes just another farm animal. We, as Christians, are much the same way; we have been equipped with amazing, gleaming colors, but, without light (Christ) we become a black and white version that blends into the world. We are told in Luke 8:16 "No one lights a lamp and hides it in a clay jar or puts it under a bed. Instead, they put it on a stand, so that those who come in can see the light".

The purpose of the rooster is what I find most amazing. It is the rooster that arises first every morning, somewhere around 4:30 a.m., and in the blackness recognizes that night is coming to a close. He turns to the east, as it knows the source of the coming light, steadies himself, straightens it's neck and belts out, "Urr, ur ur urrrrrrr!". The sound pierces the night as the blast of the trumpet, proclaiming, "The light has overcome the darkness, ARISE, ARISE from your slumber". He lets go with another blast and every creature, within a half mile cannot escape the sound. Immediately, a chain reaction ensues with other roosters, the barking dog, the mooing cow, the chicken's cluck, even the animals in the deep woods begin to respond to the call.

The rooster, required to be bold in his calling, is a watchman over the flock. He is not always

appreciated and is sometimes cursed by those that do not want to awaken from their slumber, yet, he sounds off, "The day is upon you, ARISE and be blessed." He does not crow to awaken the flock out of spite or nuisance, but out of love for the members within his domain that the day not be wasted.

The rooster then proceeds with his day, not as a judge, but as one who has fulfilled his calling for that day; tomorrow will bring "new" opportunity.

There are similarities with the rooster in the farmyard and the Christian in the world. We are to be watchmen (persons) and it is our responsibility to seek the Light constantly and "sound off" that the light has overcome the darkness. The message can sometimes be as the blast of the rooster, maybe a whisper, even

without sound in the form of a smile or a hug. We are called to proclaim celebration of the New Day that is in us, as well as the one to come. We are to be diligent and consistent in HIS call on our lives, without anxiety or fear of the worldview. We are to love as He has loved us.

The rooster, quite the amazing animal, is yet another example of the creations of God that, on the surface, may seem insignificant ,yet, has tremendous depth and purpose that transcends the eye. He is magnificent in color, courageous in his message and consistent with his purpose.
